The Conference Overview

The field of heritage studies has advanced beyond solely preserving monuments, objects, and historical locations to become a vibrant area of interest focused on memory, identity, authority, sustainability, and social change. Nowadays, heritage is not just seen as a reflection of the past but as a disputed and constructive domain where societies negotiate current circumstances and envision future prospects. Throughout Africa and developing countries, heritage is being redefined as a crucial asset for tackling modern issues related to fairness, environmental resolution, cultural strength, technological progress, and comprehensive growth.

Taking place in Harare, Zimbabwe, the 2nd International Conference on Heritage (ICOH 2026) offers an interdisciplinary forum for exploring the changing role of heritage within the interconnected contexts of decolonisation, sustainable growth, and the digital realm. The event aims to examine the significant changes influencing heritage research, policies, and practices in the twenty-first century and beyond.

As communities confront challenges like climate change, globalisation, digitalisation, cultural uniformity, and the lasting impacts of colonialism, pressing inquiries arise: How can heritage promote fairer and more sustainable futures? How can we empower indigenous peoples and historically marginalised groups in terms of knowledge? What can heritage do to support economic progress, social unity, and environmental care? How can digital tools be used to democratize heritage accessibility without perpetuating historical biases and exclusions?

Recent studies in Critical Heritage Studies, Indigenous Heritage Studies, and Decolonial Studies have questioned established knowledge assumptions that continue to influence heritage management, conservation, and portrayal. These discussions bring up crucial issues about whose heritage is esteemed, who dictates heritage narratives, how information is generated and validated, and how emerging technologies transform cultural memory, ownership, involvement, and availability. Simultaneously, international frameworks such as the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), UNESCO cultural agreements, and the African Union's Agenda 2063 increasingly acknowledge culture and heritage as key assets for sustainable growth, peacebuilding, social integration, and economic change.

Given this context, ICOH 2026 invites academics, professionals, policymakers, Indigenous knowledge keepers, community guardians, creative industry figures, digital pioneers, and postgraduate students to take part in vital discussions on the future of heritage in Africa and beyond. The conference specifically encourages contributions that go beyond theoretical analysis to provide practical research, inventive methodologies, community-centered initiatives, policy guidance, and feasible solutions rooted in local circumstances and worldwide dialogues.

Conference Objectives

- 1. Heritage Conservation and Preservation in the Digital Age**
Digital documentation, artificial intelligence, virtual heritage, digital archives, digital repatriation, and emerging technologies in heritage conservation.
- 2. Creative Industries for Economic Development**
Cultural and creative economies, cultural tourism, innovation, entrepreneurship, and sustainable livelihoods.
- 3. Linguistic Heritages for the Future of Africa**
Language preservation, revitalization, linguistic justice, language policy, and digital futures for African languages.
- 4. Heritage Management Policy, Ethics, and Governance**
Heritage legislation, governance frameworks, ethics, community rights, and institutional transformation.
- 5. Intangible Cultural Heritage for Sustainable Development**
Oral traditions, rituals, performing arts, traditional craftsmanship, living heritage, and cultural resilience.
- 6. Heritage-Based Education for Sustainable Development**

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- Heritage education, curriculum transformation, Indigenous pedagogies, heritage literacy, and community learning.
- 7. Liberation Heritage and the Future**
Memory politics, heritage of resistance, liberation archives, commemorative practices, and postcolonial nation-building.
 - 8. Indigenous Knowledge Systems and Community Engagement for Sustainability**
Traditional ecological knowledge, community-based heritage management, participatory governance, and Indigenous approaches to sustainability.
 - 9. Religious Heritage and Sustainable Development**
Sacred sites, pilgrimage traditions, faith-based heritage conservation, spiritual landscapes, and religious tourism.
 - 10. Heritage Entrepreneurship and Gender**
Gendered dimensions of heritage economies, women's empowerment, youth entrepreneurship, and inclusive development.
 - 11. Community Media, Cultural Heritage, and Sustainable Development**
Community broadcasting, digital storytelling, cultural memory, Indigenous media, and participatory communication.
 - 12. Onomastics and Culture**
Naming practices, place names, identity formation, memory, language politics, and decolonizing naming systems.
 - 13. Decolonizing Heritage: Narratives, Knowledge, and Practice**
Decolonial methodologies, restitution and repatriation, Indigenous epistemologies, heritage justice, and the transformation of heritage institutions.
 - 14. Heritage and Inclusivity in the Digital Age**
Accessibility, disability inclusion, digital equity, participatory heritage platforms, and representation of marginalized communities.
 - 15. Heritage, Climate Change, and Agricultural Sustainability**
Traditional agricultural systems, climate adaptation, food heritage, environmental conservation, and ecological resilience.

Submission Guidelines

Abstracts should:

- Be between **250–300 words**.
- Clearly articulate the research problem, objectives, theoretical framework, methodology, findings (or anticipated findings), and scholarly contribution.
- Include **five keywords**.
- Indicate the relevant conference sub-theme.
- Be submitted in Microsoft Word format.
